Creating a Culture of Caring

Chief Clunis was born in Harmony Vale Jamaica and immigrated to Winnipeg in 1975 at age 11. Growing up in a diverse and sometimes challenging environment. he witnessed sociofirsthand the economic challenges faced by many groups in society. It was his desire to impact social change that led Chief Clunis to join the Winnipeg Police Service in 1987. Chief Clunis is married to his wife Pearlene and has two daughters.

He has served in major areas of the Police Service, including Uniform Patrol. Traffic, Plainclothes Investigation, Community Relations, Organizational Development & Support, as well as a number of administrative leadership roles. Chief Clunis is an avid volunteer participating in mentorship programs. police basketball and bicycle relay teams, and also serves as a police chaplain. He was a recipient of the Police Service's Award of Excellence in 2002 recognizing his outstanding po

lice and community work. His leadership philosophy who believes the future is "people first" and consistently seeks to create a healthy work environment for those he is privileged to lead. Chief Clunis was promoted to Patrol Sergeant in 2002, Sergeant 2004, Inspector in 2007, Superintendent in 2010, and was appointed Winnipeg's 17th Chief of Police November 2012.

Chief Clunis has ushered in an era of Crime Prevention through Social Development for the city of Winnipeg, believing that providing cross cultural opportunities for social and economic equity will create a safer, healthier Winnipeg, resulting sustainable crime reduction.

He is president of the Manitoba Association of Chiefs of Police, member of the Board of Directors of The Canadian Police Knowledge Network and member of the Poverty Reduction Council of Winnipeg.

He is a respected leader of Winnipeg hinges on the creation of a culture of safety for all, and is proud to help lead in this way.

In the spirit of these efforts, Chief Devon Clunis has started a video blog series dubbed "Creating a Culture of Safety".

This video series is his opportunity to communicate with the community on a regular basis by sharing information about what is happening within the Winnipeg Police Service and about new initiatives.

Commonwealth Women Parliamentarians

Commonwealth Women Parliamentarians (CWP) International was founded by women delegates at the 1989 plenary conference of Commonwealth Parliamentary Association (CPA) so women at future conferences could discuss ways to increase female representation in Parliament and work towards the mainstreaming of gender considerations in all CPA activities and programmes. In 2004, the group was formally recognized in the CPA Constitution.

Myrna attended international meetings for 6 years—3 as CWP Canada's Vice Chair and 3 as CWP Canada's Chair. The Chair also represents Canada on the International Steering Committee; she was elected Vice Chair on the International

Steering Committee for a 1 year term.


CWP Canada was created in 2005 and is made up of women parliamentarians and legislators from across Canada. A concerted focus on the functioning of CWP Canada took up much of Myrna's time in the past several years. CWP Canada has the goals of increasing female representation in legislatures in Canada and the Commonwealth. Its goals and objectives are:

- to provide opportunities for strategic discussion and development for future and current parliamentarians
- Increase female representation in our parliaments
- Foster closer relationships among Canadian women

- parliamentarians
- Foster relations with other countries having close parliamentary ties with
 Canada; and
- Discuss, strategize and act on gender related issues in Canada and internationally.

The CWP pursues these objectives by means of annual Commonwealth parliamentary conferences, outreach programs and participation in campaign schools across the country.

As Myrna finishes her term she is pleased that she was able to lead CWP Canada through a strategic planning process. CWP Canada is at the forefront internationally in organizational development and achievements.
